


THIS PIECE

This Piece was choreographed in the Fall of 2017 and explores what the phrase "you aren't really living until you're almost dead" means to the six dancers on stage and the audience in the room. In order to unpack the meaning behind these words, the saying will be analyzed from a physical, aesthetic and emotional perspective using intricate and humanistic movements. The creation of This Piece will be done through an exploration of how Hemingway's Iceberg Theory can be translated into a choreographic process. The Iceberg Theory is a minimalistic approach to writing where only surface details, such as descriptions of setting and dialogue between characters, are included while larger thematic elements are left open to interpretation. This form of writing evokes a more intense emotional response from the reader. The combination of the creative development behind the movement and the sensory experience of the dancers will parallel the emotional response Hemingway was able to evoke in his readers through The Iceberg Theory and invite the audience of This Piece to engage with the choreography on a more intimate level. At the end of This Piece, the audience will be able to analyze the true meaning behind the phrase "you aren't really living until you're almost dead."

LANDING STRIP

Landing Strip, choreographed in the Fall of 2016, was inspired by the book of poems Milk and Honey by Rupi Kaur. This work comments on how women are portrayed in today's society by juxtaposing sexualized movement with the romantic song "You Really Got a Hold on Me" covered by the band She and Him. By choosing to put blunt sexual gestures over the harmonic lyrics of this song, I hope to show the audience how women's sexuality can be used to show our strength and pride as women rather than allow it to be the tool that society uses to limit us.

JOHNNY GOT HIS GUN

Johnny Got His Gun, which was choreographed in the Fall of 2015, is about what happens when an individual's mind is strong, but their body is failing. One of the dancers uses various dynamics and movement concepts to represent an individual's mind, and the other dancer utilizes similar tools to demonstrate the body. The beginning of the piece will tell the story of the dancers realizing that the body is failing. The second section will show the anger of the mind as the body is struggling. The final section will be when the body must finally give up, and the mind has to find acceptance and peace in the situation.

MASTER CLASSES

Abigail has taught master classes to dance students of all ages and experience levels. Abigail leads her students through the choreographic process she has created, which translates Hemingway's Iceberg Theory into a technique to create dances. During her time with the students, she explains how her method allows the dancers to experience what the actual sensations of the movements feel like within her set of choreographic movements. Next, she leads the students through a method of generating movement used in her choreographic technique, which is a modified version of Hot Mess, a technique created by Alex Ketley. This goal of this is to give the students an opportunity to understand how movement can be crafted through Abigail's process of choreography as well as what it feels to have strong sensory engagement within movement.
